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Sports Partnership Activities ...this year we have taken part in many sporting events and festivals and these have really raised the profile of sport in school. The children have enjoyed developing new skills. We have taken part in a range of sports including- orienteering, archery, rounders, tennis, cross country, gymnastics, athletics and more.

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School Trips - A whole school trip to the pantomime at Harrogate, Tiger Class went on a 'Castle Tour' and also visited Tesco as part of their topic work. Key Stage 2 pupils took part

in a Countryside Day, carried out a local river study, visited St. Nicholas Church and took part in a Mosque visit. They also visited Tropical World.
